Tec de Monterrey continues transformation process towards the future

Tecnológico de Monterrey has reported that **David Garza** (who will assume his role as the Tec's new president on July 1st) **will take full responsibility** for the institution's areas and operations as of today, May 1st.

Salvador Alva, President of the Tec, reported to the Tec Community that he had recommended the Tec's Board of Directors take this decision due to the current situation:

"Owing to the unexpected event of the COVID-19 pandemic (...) we have activated the "emergency process" to assign the highest priority to (...) the physical and emotional health of our community and our positive contribution to Mexico.

During this period, David has already assumed important leadership in these efforts, and we have both made prompt decisions for our community that at the same time place Tec de Monterrey in a very significant position of influence for contributing to the country.

In line with this joint collaboration, I have recommended that our Board of Directors take advantage of this moment to take the next step in our transition process and allow David to take full responsibility for various areas and operations as of May 1st, which will allow us to dedicate the months of May and June to transferring those institutional powers I still hold to

him and, at the same time, support his position as the new leader of the Tec."

Garza already held the position of rector of this institution and was **appointed in January** to substitute **Salvador Alva** as president from July.

Due to the announcement, the Tec has also reported **some changes to the institution's organizational chart**:

- Juan Pablo Murra Lascuráin will be the new Rector for Undergraduate and Postgraduate Areas.
- Inés Sáenz Negrete joins the management team as Vice President for Inclusion, Social Impact, and Sustainability.
- Bruno Zepeda Blouin will be the new Rector of Tecmilenio University, replacing Héctor Escamilla.

Here is the announcement in full:

Monterrey, Nuevo León, on May 1, 2020. On January 10, the Board of Directors for Tecnológico de Monterrey announced the retirement of Salvador Alva as president of this institution, with David Garza as its new president from July 1st of this year.

Owing to this process and the unexpected event of the Covid-19 pandemic, with its profound implications for the Tec and its community, Garza Salazar has already assumed important leadership in all efforts made by the institution. Therefore, its current president, Salvador Alva, has

announced that, "he has recommended the Board of Directors take advantage of this moment to take the next step in our transition process and allow Garza Salazat to take full responsibility for various areas and operations as of May 1st."

In these times of unprecedented uncertainty, with strong implications for the lives of everyone, we need to adapt to the dramatic changes that this new reality involves.

"We are proud of the great talent that inspires us," said Garza Salazar, who announced the following changes to the Tec's structure as a result of this decision:

Juan Pablo Murra Lascurain assumes the position of Rector for Tecnológico de Monterrey's Undergraduate and Postgraduate Areas, whose main challenges will be consolidating the Tec21 Educational Model and its development due to the opportunities and challenges of the new situation, strengthening research and postgraduate degrees, and the integrated learning of our students.

Inés Sáenz Negrete joins the management team as Vice President for Inclusion, Social Impact, and Sustainability, to guarantee that people are always at the heart of the institution's decisions and that social responsibility is strengthened.

Bruno Zepeda Blouin assumes the position of **Rector of Tecmilenio University** to define and implement a strategy that allows it to have an impact on millions of people through innovative education models.

Murra previously held the title of Vice President of Relations and Development.
